# Minutes of the Annual Meeting of Saint James' Church

Hyde Park, New York

Sunday January 29, 2023

## **Opening of Meeting**

Mother Meredith opened the meeting in prayer at 10:50.

Mother Meredith nominated Mike Glancey to be the clerk. Doug seconded. All approved

Mother Meredith explained the method for voting today both in person and on Zoom. Mother Meredith requested a motion to approve the meeting to be held in hybrid, both in person and on Zoom...Justin moved 2<sup>nd</sup> by Jim. None opposed.

Meredith requested a motion to approve the minutes from last year. Lillian moved and Eric seconded. Mary Gabel mentioned that her last name was spelled incorrectly. It will be corrected.

## **Priest's Report**

Mother Meredith extended her thanks and appreciation for being at St James and thanked everyone for the part they played both in getting her and her family here but in also helping to keep St James thriving over the last few difficult years. Mother Meredith spoke about her report with emphasis on building relationships and re-building the church.

## Warden's Report

Andy Hall spoke on his report. He expressed his thanks for the work that Jim does extremely effectively as the treasurer of the church. Added that we will be looking to fill-in roles such as pledge clerk, ushers and greeters. Mentioned how far we have come with being able to record the services. He expressed his thanks for all the work that Doug has accomplished as senior warden.

## Deacon's Report

Deacon Gail opened with a collect for diversity to recognize the injustices that have been happening in the world as of late. Deacon Gail gave a shoutout of thanks to all the members of the outreach committee, especially to Joanne Lown for her work. She expresses thanks to Deb Belding for the work that she does with the Community Garden, as well as Sue DeLorenzo for her work with the NY Hati project. She expressed her thanks to St James for all of our work at helping to extend God's mission. Deacon Gail continued to talk about the work that outreach plans to be involved in in the coming year. She asked us to be sure that we reach out to our local leaders to identify injustices and express our interest in current issues.

### Treasurer's Report

Jim read his report to the congregation. He mentioned that although 2022 was a difficult year like most years, St James was blessed with good fortune due to the generosity of the congregation. He highlighted that due to the recent poor performance of the stock market our investments declined. He also highlighted that the generosity of the church helped us to exceed our budget for pledge income by 10% for the year.

Jim went on to talk about the budget for next year. The budget is a deficit budget of \$13,331.94. He spoke about the need to make an amendment to the by-laws to increase the expenditure limit from \$500 to 1500 to reflect the effects of inflation of the years. Jim mentioned that he would also propose a bylaws committee to review the bylaws.

Jim proposed that the budget be approved. Mike G seconded. Russell asked Jim to speak to the \$13000 dollar deficit. Jim said that he is completely comfortable with it in that we have ample reserves. All present members approved the budget.

Mother Meredith explained that we can hear the amendment to increase the expenditure limit at this meeting but that the parish will be able to approve this amendment in a future congregation meeting.

Jim asked to appoint a committee to review the bylaws and to propose any updates. Bobby Wells seconded. All members approved.

## **Vestry Elections**

Patty Glancey announced the candidates that are standing for the vestry.

- Melinda Harris for a first 3 year term for the Vestry

Mother Meredith recognized Andy Hall to announce the results. All candidates were elected.

Mother Meredith expressed her thanks for Doug Belding, outgoing senior warden, for all of the work that he has done for the parish.

Mother Meredith commissioned the newly elected members of the Vestry.

### Appointment of Nominating Committee

Mother Meredith asked for three volunteers to serve on the 2023 nominating committee as non-Vestry members.

Deb Belding, Walter Koch, Brain Rance all volunteered.

# Minutes of the Special Meeting of Saint James' Church

Hyde Park, New York

Sunday, November 12, 2023

Mother Meredith called the meeting to order at 9:09 with a prayer.

Jim Smyth made a motion, seconded by Lillian Peralta, to appoint Walter Koch as recording secretary. The motion passed.

Mike Glancey briefed the congregation on the reasons for creating the Bylaw revision task force, namely bringing the Bylaws up to date with various governing agencies, new technology, means of communication and general clarification.

Maggie McNamara then presented an overview of how the Task Force operated. The impetus for setting up the project was Treasurer Jim Smythe's request at the last Annual Meeting to amend the Bylaws to reflect the increase in cost of living in writing checks that do not need Vestry approval, namely from \$500 to \$1,500. The committee met six times and spent over 12 hours on the project. Sample Diocesan bylaws, Canon law, and NY State religious not-for profit laws were consulted in making alterations and additions. An effort was made to keep the original format of the church Bylaws intact as much as possible.

The results were presented to the Vestry in August and approved by the Vestry in October. The changes will be voted on at the Annual Meeting in January. A two/thirds majority of those present is needed to finalize the revision.

The floor was then opened for questions.

A clarification of quorum and parishioner was requested. State law says 10%, the Diocese requires 25%. A parishioner is defined as being over age 18 and is a regular church attendee

who contributes financial support to the church for the previous 12 months. The parishioner count is monitored in a database and recorded in the annual parish report.

Steve Gausepohl asked who drafts the budget. The Vestry appoints a committee or person to the task; the finance committee of the old bylaws was changed for flexibility.

Wilma Tully asked if the assistant treasurer was bonded. The assistant treasure is not required but if one were appointed, they would be bonded according to the bylaws.

Wendy Urban-Mead asked if there was a difference between Vestry person and Vestry member. No, but alterations were made for consistency.

There being no further questions, Mother Meredith thanked the committee members for their service. Mike Glancey especially thanked Maggie McNamara for her knowledge and hard work.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting at 9:20; the motion passed.

## Priest's Report

Jesus tells us, "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."

We do!

2023 was our first full year of ministry together, and life has been abundant: joyful, challenging, hopeful. This church is full of life. We are full of contagious joy at the God who called us here and walks with us into the future.

I'm proud of us, and grateful to God.

This summer, as the last faithful folks were tidying up the Parish Hall after the funeral reception for our dear John Golden, Jr., I was alone, washing my hands in the restroom. I remember the moment so clearly. I thought of the day: of the faces of over one hundred parishioners and community members who had gathered here to mourn and celebrate. Of the folks who cleaned the church, set up chairs on the lawn, set up the AV equipment. Of the sound of our singing together. And I thought, "I can't wait to call up John, and talk about how proud we are of this church." And then I realized...

This, of course, is part of the pain and beauty of our abundant life together. We are constantly losing what we love, even as we gain what we had not known to hope for. There are so many new faces at St. James' this year (thank God!), folks who never got to know our saints like John. Your new priest never knew the countless saints like Gloria, or Allelu, or Fr. Kidd, except through your stories. But these saints who built the church we have are with us even now, and I believe they are cheering us on as we build what the next generation will receive with grateful hearts.

At last year's Annual Meeting, I had been your priest for just short of three months. I named three hopes: we'd build and strengthen relationships; we'd rebuild ministries disrupted by the pandemic; we'd begin to discover new ways that God is calling us.

Those hopes have been met, abundantly!

Hope shows up in the numbers, because we're growing. The number of people in church on Sundays increased 26% this year. We welcomed lots of new faces and celebrated six baptisms and five adult confirmations/receptions. And we took care of one another: visiting the sick, remembering one another in our prayers, writing cards and making phone calls.

Hope shows up in hard work done cheerfully. Thank you for decluttering our closets, emptying our attics, and organizing our files. The stage in our Parish Hall is clear, and being used once again for performances! Thank you for making the coffee and stacking the chairs. Thank you for polishing our brass and weeding our gardens. Thank you for reviewing our parish bylaws line-by-line and for preparing the financial reports. Thank you for coming in late at night, after work, to get the furnace fixed, and getting up early to edit the newsletter. Thank you.

Hope shows up in the programs and events, because we had a *lot* of fun together this year and we also learned together, prayed deeply, and cared for one another in the hardest moments. We brought back and renewed beloved ministries, from acolytes and ushers to Lenten Breakfasts and the Mother's Day Tea. We ate well—remember the fabulous potluck in our Community Garden after the annual Garden Blessing, or the Candlemas Soup Supper with St. Margaret's? We traveled to the Bronx to join hundreds of others packing food for our siblings in Haiti. We cheered for our Youth Group as they planned monthly events, from a fall harvest festival day to a morning cooking a meal for our homeless neighbors. We had a blast doing our St. Francis Day Blessing of the Animals in a new way (which had us meeting dozens of new neighbors) and we held space for broken hearts with special services like our Service of Remembrance for Pregnancy and Infant Loss, and our Prayer for Peace in the Holy Land.

We do have so much to be proud of-so much for which we give thanks to God.

Because all of this—the growth, the programs and events, the lives touched, redeemed, and transformed—wells up from our abundant, deep joy in one another, in our mission, and in God.

It's because we drink from the wellspring of **joy in Christ** that our hard work is not grim, but cheerful. We meet challenges not with anxiety, but with curiosity, even excitement. God is with us in all we do together. We know why we're here—to have life, together, abundantly.

The year ahead will challenge us and demand our best. We will be addressing a pattern of unsustainable financial deficit—and it matters that we do, because we want this joy-filled place to be here to welcome the generations of saints that God will call here long after we're gone. We will be offering hospitality in new and difficult ways: from challenging ourselves to make a real plan to get our bathrooms fully handicap accessible, to ensuring that we're incorporating new members' gifts, talents, and ways of serving.

With God's help, we can do this. We *are* doing this. We have the resources and the momentum. We are here. We are so very alive. And friends: **we have the joy**.

Being able to watch Sunday service (not always on Sunday) gave me a feeling of connection with my St. James' family. This was a great comfort as hotel rooms can sometimes be very lonely. As we continue our journey of renewal and rediscovery here at St. James', I believe our AV club can and will become a more useful tool to help us "Know Christ and make him known." Each year our infrastructure needs different amounts of care from light fixtures being installed to leaking pipes being repaired to boilers relit to emptying attics and having stuff hauled away. # Deacon's Report

Go forth in peace, bringing the Light of Christ into the world. The Light that shines love, reconciliation, hope, justice and respect for human dignity into the dark corners of our community and the world.

On Tuesday, January 23rd, many Episcopalians from around the country will gather together in a theater near them to view the documentary: **The Case for Love: Bridging the Divide,** inspired by the teachings and writings of Presiding Bishop Michael Curry.

Last December, I had the opportunity to join an Episcopal Parish Network webinar for a preview and discussion of the documentary and how it came into being. The documentary reflects ordinary people from all walks of life and different ethnicities on how they are striving to live out their call to love their neighbors.

What stood out to everyone on the webinar was the t-shirt that each of the panelists wore.

Love over Hate Love over Indifference Love over Ego Love over Ignorance Love over Fear Love over Barriers Love over Borders Love over and over and over again!

As Presiding Bishop Michael Curry continues to remind us each day: "As the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus Movement we follow the Way of Jesus. His way is the Way of Love, and that love has the power to change lives and change the world."

As followers of Christ, as Episcopalians, our baptismal covenant calls each of us to seek and serve Christ in all persons, to love our neighbors as ourselves, to strive for justice and peace among all people and to respect the dignity of every human being.

It is not easy to be a follower of Christ and to be the messenger of love that has the power to change lives amidst the constant sounds of fear and hate, the sounds of the devastation of war in Gaza, in the Ukraine and in other parts of the world including the sounds of human rights violations and injustices that constantly permeate our society.

Jesus expects us, as his followers, to actively engage in the world around us. We cannot hide behind closed doors that blinds us to our surroundings. We cannot be indifferent or remain neutral to issues of injustices that need our attention and our response; injustices that wipe away the respect and dignity of our neighbors. "I will, with God's help" is our response as we work together to solve the many pressing injustices facing God's beloved children.

As a deacon of the Church, one of my primary responsibilities is to interpret to the Church, the needs, concerns and hopes of the world. That means that I must traverse back and forth between the parish community and the wider community both near and far in addition to engaging in opportunities to broaden my understanding on various policy issues.

Zoom continues to provide us with the opportunity to connect, not only with our local community, but also with the wider community and for that, I am most grateful. Zoom gathers us for meetings, webinars and prayer services to learn, to listen, to pray and to engage in discussions on issues that need addressing in today's unsettling world.

My responsibilities here at St. James' not only includes liturgical responsibilities but also supporting the work of our Outreach Committee, attending Vestry meetings and participating in our Evening Prayer and Compline services each week.

We are advocates which means our mission work is advocacy. Advocacy means we contact our local, state and federal legislative members, including organizations connected to the issue, on issues that need addressing by making our views known to them. It is lending a voice for our neighbors whose voices are either not being heard or are being ignored by our leaders in power. As a longtime advocate for farmworkers, for our environment, for refugees and for human rights issues, the following represents some of the organizations that I connect with on a regular basis:

## Treasurer's Report

The major financial event of the year was the bequests of John Golden. They totaled \$700,000: \$200,000.00 for the chapel in a restricted bequest and \$500,000.00 for the general operations of the church. These bequests continued the great financial good fortune that Saint James' experienced over the past several years. I have stood before you many times and presented budgets that were in deficit only to have some unanticipated beneficial event/s lift us into the black. The last few years have been especially beneficial. The total of unanticipated gifts and bequests exceeds \$1,000,000.

The Church's financial position as of December is as follows:

Checking account balance	\$250,478.90

The church, for the immediate future, is on very solid financial ground. Beneath the surface, however, we are spending \$92,000 more than we are taking in. The church can run like this but eventually the endowment funds will begin to wither, and fewer funds will be available for the activities of the church.

A finance committee has been formed to explore the ways the budget can be brought into line.

# 2024 Parish Operating Budget Executive Summary

## How We Will Fund Our 2024 Budget

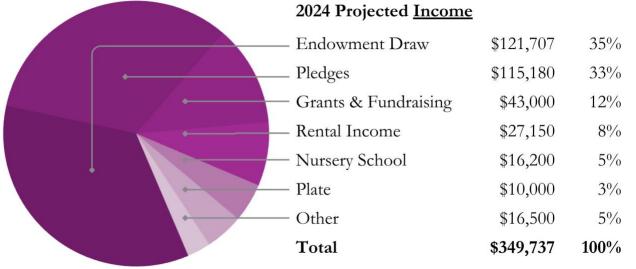
Like many communities of faith, we rely on pledges and gifts from our members to support our ministry. Here at St. James', the generous pledges we have collectively committed for 2024 will account for 33% of our annual income. Thank you for these!

We typically withdraw a prudent 5% from our several endowment funds annually, supporting our mission while allowing the fund to slowly continue growing. We are grateful to the parishioners who made these generous endowments part of their legacy.

In 2024, the endowment draw will make up 35% of our annual operating income. This is higher than in past years as new funds have recently been added to our investments. In 2023, the parish was blessed both by an unrestricted \$500,000 bequest and by a \$200,000 bequest restricted for support of our Chapel. The Vestry has placed the Chapel bequest into our restricted Chapel endowment and placed \$400,000 of the unrestricted bequest in our general endowment. (The Vestry has temporarily retained \$100,000 of the unrestricted gift as it evaluates 2024 priorities.) Together, the 5% revenue draw we have budgeted against the \$600,000 in new endowment funds will provide an increased capacity to draw measured income in 2024 for both unrestricted activities and for the maintenance and missions of our East Market Street Chapel.

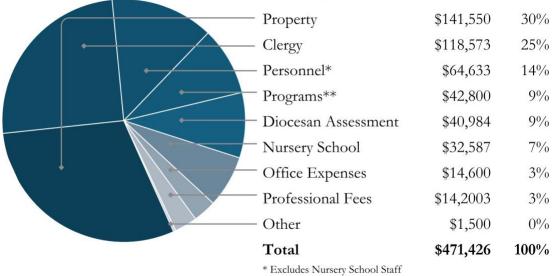
Fundraising events such as the popular Graveyard Tours, occasional grants, special gifts, and income from space rentals are expected to comprise the remainder of our 2024 income.

We are entirely self-funded. We do not receive financial support from the Diocese of New York for our operations.



## How We Allocate Our Proposed 2024 Spending Budget

Our preliminary spending budget for 2024 reflects our values, responsibilities, and to some degree our habits and customary expenditures. We are stewards of a significant property and history. Care of our buildings and grounds—including our historic churchyard and East Market Street Chapel—accounts for 30% of our total budget. For 2024 this includes necessary repairs of the Parish House apartment which will allow us to rent it again. The clergy and paid staff who lead us in serving our mission account, together, for 39% of our total budget. Our 2024 proposed budget includes a 3.2% cost-of-living increase for lay staff.

## A Funding Deficit

The 2024 Proposed Budget reflects a deficit of \$122,000. This is sobering, but not a new reality; the Vestry has approved deficit budgets for at least a decade, ranging from a budgeted \$19,000 deficit in 2015 to a budgeted \$107,000 deficit in 2020.

In many recent years, anticipated shortfalls have been avoided by year-end, due to factors such as:

- Additional large annual gifts from generous parishioners (members of the largest of these leadership donor households are now deceased)
- An anonymous \$150,000 gift in 2021
- PPP Loan funding in 2020
- Significant reduction in expenses in 2020, 2021, and 2022 due to COVID-19 restrictions on activity and a significant period of time without full-time clergy

- Bequests and special gifts from members, often between \$10,000 and \$50,000, have been a blessing, year after year. In 2022 and 2023, we received significant six-figure bequests (\$232,500 in 2022; \$700,000 in 2023)
- In some years, we have drawn greater than the recommended 5% from our endowments. Thankfully, recently this hasn't happened often.

## Working Together Toward Financial Sustainability

As you can see above, St. James' has been greatly blessed by the generous self-giving of our members. We hope this continues long into the future. However, we cannot rely on being "rescued" by some of the very extraordinary six-figure gifts which have balanced our budgets in recent years.

So the Vestry of St. James' will engage in rigorous discernment in 2024 about ways to both reduce expenses and generate income. Our goal is to trim where we can, expand revenue inflows, and in so doing move toward balanced budget proposals in future years.

We believe it will take the whole parish working together over time to respond with our time, talent, and treasure to meet the challenge of financial sustainability. We welcome ideas from all members of our congregation. Difficult cost-reducing decisions, as well as investment in key revenue-generating projects, need to be part of this story:

- We have significant responsibilities as stewards of historic property. How can we develop our property as an income generating asset, through rentals and more? How can each part of our property contribute?
- How can we work together to reduce the financial burden of our property? Mowing, tree work, and snow management costs are high. Maintenance demands never cease. And energy bills certainly add up. Where and how can we trim? Where can we invest in improvements which lower our operating and resource footprint costs?
- We will invest together in stewardship, exploring fundraising efforts, mini capital campaigns, and new property care initiatives. All ideas welcome!
- We are a church—Jesus, the incarnate love of God, is at the center of all we do. That means that our work together needs to be driven by and answerable to the mission of St. James' and our joy in Christ and one another.

## A New Beginning

St. James' Episcopal Church has served the Hyde Park community since 1812. In our first centuries, we have weathered many storms, raised up great leaders, and brought generations to Christ.

As 2024 begins, our church is growing. Love, care, and joy are evident everywhere we look. We know that God has great things in store for St. James' Church.

By the grace of God, the work begun in 2024 will lay the groundwork for the next two centuries of worship and service in this place.

## Altar Guild Report

The "Annual Report" of the Altar Guild of Saint James describes the purpose and the function of the Altar Guild at St. James' Episcopal Church for the past year, 2023. Visitors and members come on Sundays and during the week when the church is open and view the church and the Altar beautifully appointed. Some people also come during the week to quietly pray and meditate. Others come to experience the history of the Roosevelt family parish and the church graveyard. Parishioners come for Sunday religious services and Fellowship. Most people are not aware of the preparations or the work the members of the Altar Guild do to keep the church and the Altar in pristine condition.

The ministry of the Altar Guild is to prepare for celebration of the sacraments, services and offices of this Episcopal Church. The Eucharist, Baptisms, Confirmations, Weddings and Burials, must be conducted with order and beauty using the necessary vessels, Altar hangings and immaculate linens. Holidays and seasonal services take extra preparation. Vestments for all participants, including clergy, acolytes, and Deacons need to be laundered and dry cleaned. Duties include housekeeping of the sanctuary and the narthex at the main Church on Albany Post Road and the Chapel/Reading Room on Market Street. The Church's Sexton, Kyle, works along with Guild members to clean, polish and vacuum each week. Members work under the direction of the Priest in charge, the Deacon and two Altar Guild Co-Chairs who function in a leadership role. There are currently three teams, rotating every two weeks for the 8 o'clock and the 10 o'clock Service. There is a sense of fellowship within the Guild, a communal, spiritual way to contribute to the community of St. James'.

The budget allocation for Altar Guild, allows us to purchase wine, wafers, candles, and replacement linens. Most recently, new vestments have been ordered for Mother Meredith, and should soon arrive. The Altar Guild welcomes anyone who would like to become part of this special ministry; we are always in need of new members. This volunteer effort is a way to extend service, giving back to the parish while spending enjoyable time with other members. At busy times, like Christmas and Easter or "Installations", family members/husbands of AG members often help out. Grateful donations from Parish members have provided the Christmas trees and the wreaths on all the doors, as well as flowers at Easter time.

The Chapel on Market Street is also cared for by the Altar Guild. A generation ago, all 8 o'clock Sunday morning services were held at the Chapel. Before Covid, we had a quarterly service annually, which was well attended. For many years, Sue DeLorenzo and John Golden, hosted a Historical Community lecture series in the winter, inviting the entire town of Hyde Park to share memories of the development of the town and the Roosevelt era. The Altar Guild and the Church Sexton care for the Chapel in off times.

Altar flowers are an integral part of every church service year-round. To commemorate a loved one or anniversary, two floral arrangements for altar flowers cost \$30. Payment should be sent to the church office and the florist can accommodate special requests. Traditionally, we do not have flowers during Lent. If you have any questions or wish to order flowers, please call the church office @ 845-229-2820 or email at stjames.hydepark@gmail.com.

The annual AG schedule for both Sunday morning services is published in January for the entire year. Tis posted in the sacristy and emailed to all members and staff. Teams rotate every two weeks throughout the year and carry out extra responsibilities of Easter, Christmas, Lent, Holy Week, Advent, weddings and funerals. There are two teams for 8:00 and 10:00 o'clock. The 8 o'clock team sets up for Sunday services and the 10 0'clock team cleans up after the services. Gratefully, a Guild member from 10 o'clock service now distributes the Altar flowers to recuperating shut-ins and Nursing Homes in the Parish Family. Linens are laundered weekly by the Co-Chairs. The church Sexton, Kyle Imperati polishes, cleans and vacuums the chancel, the body of the church. A special note of thanks to Deacon Gail for all her help with the Altar Guild. She is our "guiding light" always there with assistance and grace.

When you come to services at St James' and everything is tidy and ready for worship, remember the hard, dedicated work of the Guild members. They, along with our Priest and Deacon, make our shared worship in this beautiful, historical church possible.

## Building and Grounds Report

The Buildings & Grounds Committee of St. James' formed or reformed late in the year, met irregularly and worked in various subgroups to help maintain, preserve, and repair the historic church's physical plant, graveyard, and chapel. Notable achievements include the removal of the trees that were growing in the mausoleums and breaking them open, clearance if the dumpster area, gravestone cleaning (study, testing, expansion to church wall), assistance with the plant improvement and repair feasibility study, interface with sexton on issues, cleaning of the small barn for use (under way), independent fundraising operations, auditorium curtain replacement estimate and sourcing, outdoor leak repair, handicap parking area surface repair, find means to provided needed church truck (observe need, find resources, determine best option, fundraise, initiate, test), interface with Community Garden to assist with improvement and maintenance (fence-line tree removal, bee resource determination, feasibility study, budget, ordering), and daily prayer for God to deliver St. James' from the sin of deferred maintenance. # The Historic Graveyard Tours Report

The twelfth season of the Tours occurred on Friday and Saturday nights during the first three weekends of October, 2023. There were four shows each night. A video compilation of the Tours appears on YouTube at the following address: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=egmI5Z5IM84&authuser=0</u>.



The cost of an adult ticket was \$25. A child's ticket was \$15. Approximately 623 tickets were purchased online, and approximately 20 additional tickets were purchased through the Parish Office. Several large groups attended the Tours, and advance purchases were the principal driver in overall attendance. For most Tour evenings, at least 40% of the total attendance was driven by ticket sales during the calendar week preceding the Tour. I estimate that at least 70% of all ticket purchasers in 2023 had purchased tickets for Tours in one or more past seasons.

The characters portrayed during the Tours were: Dr. H. Sherman Hirst (1914-1982); Mary E. Johnston (1798–1878); Nathaniel Pendleton (1756-1822); Ruth Livingston Mills (1855-1920); Sara Delano (Roosevelt) (1854–1941); and Fr. Sturgis Allen (1850–1929). Reviews by those who attended were uniformly positive.

The 2023 Graveyard Tours raised \$8,037.50, which is a decrease of \$4,168.03 from 2022. As the comparative profit and loss statement below demonstrates, the decrease was principally attributable to (a) three additional professional actors (which raised actor salaries by \$1,240) and (b) a reduction in ticket sales by 65 tickets (\$1,625 at the adult ticket price of \$25).

We began the year by continuing the Adopt A Meal program, which provides one meal and dessert to 60 residents in the Homeless Shelter, once a month. This program, that began in 2021, has remained successful. Kerri Palermo took on the role left by Deb Belding to oversee the coordination.

St. James' Outreach had a frank discussion on our role in 2023. *What are we looking to support so it spreads Gods word and share his love with the community and the world at large?* We talked about how food shortages and costs are impacting our communities.
